College Admissions Are Still Unfair

But when fancy schools like Amherst kill legacy preferences, they do get a little fairer.

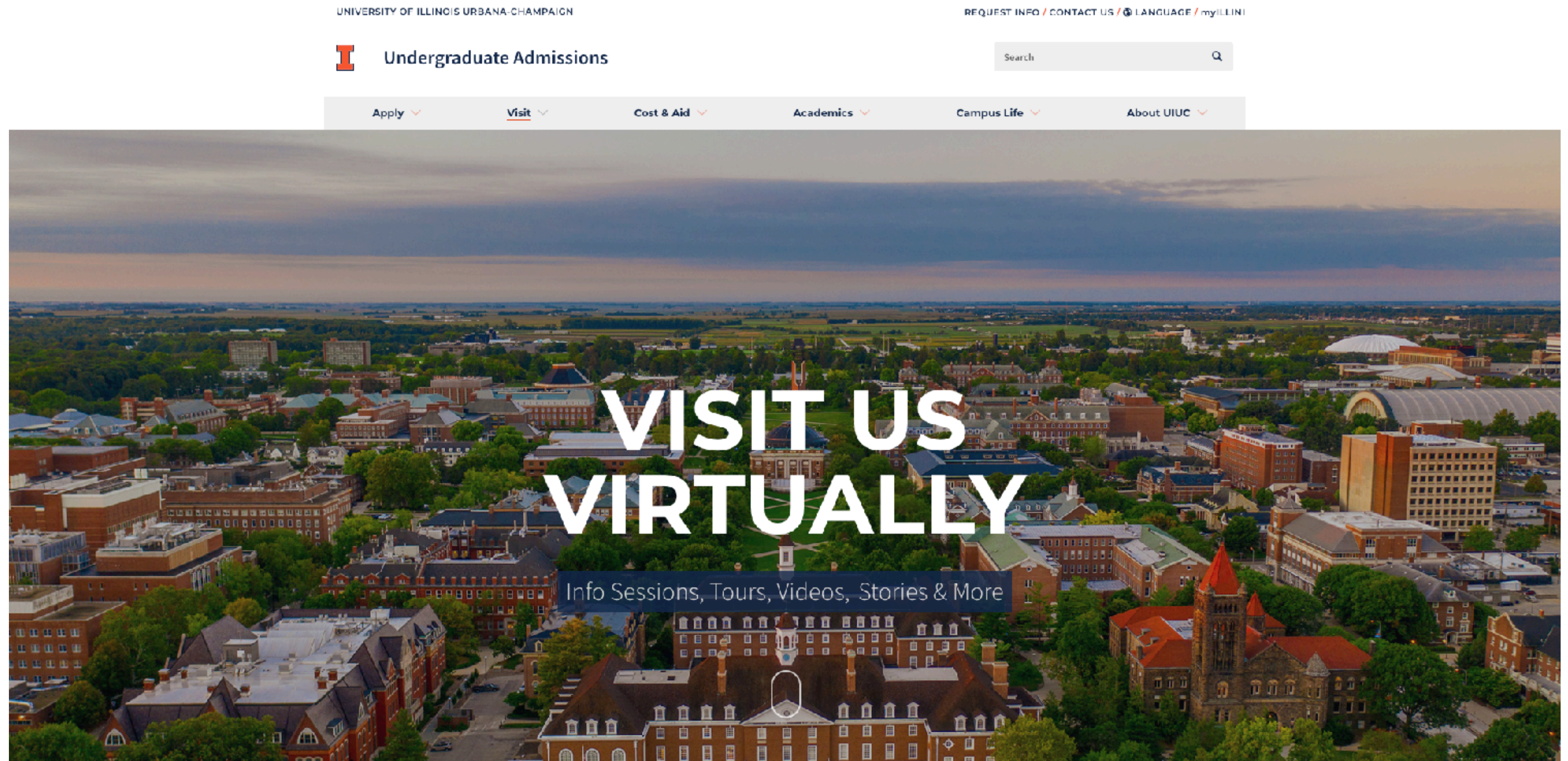

This week Amherst College announced that it was ending the use of legacy preferences in its admissions process. Its president, Biddy Martin, acknowledged that providing an advantage to applicants who are the children of alumni “inadvertently limits educational opportunity.” When incredibly wealthy, highly selective colleges such as Amherst (endowment: \$3.7 billion; admission rate: 8 percent) make an announcement like this, it’s tempting to pour a bucket of cold water on the self-congratulatory fireworks they’re lighting for themselves. That should not happen this time.

Still, the temptation is real. Why congratulate a college for doing something it should have done a long time ago? Many large public universities, including the University of California, the University of Texas, and Texas A&M, dropped legacy preferences years ago, as did Johns Hopkins University two years ago and MIT and CalTech before it. Pomona College, a highly ranked liberal-arts college like Amherst, dropped legacy preference in 2017. What’s more, even at those places that give the offspring of alumni an edge, or what admissions offices call a “tip,” legacies usually account for a small share of the enrolled class, and many of those admits would likely have gotten in without the advantage, or so the admissions deans defending the practice of birthright advantage like to say.

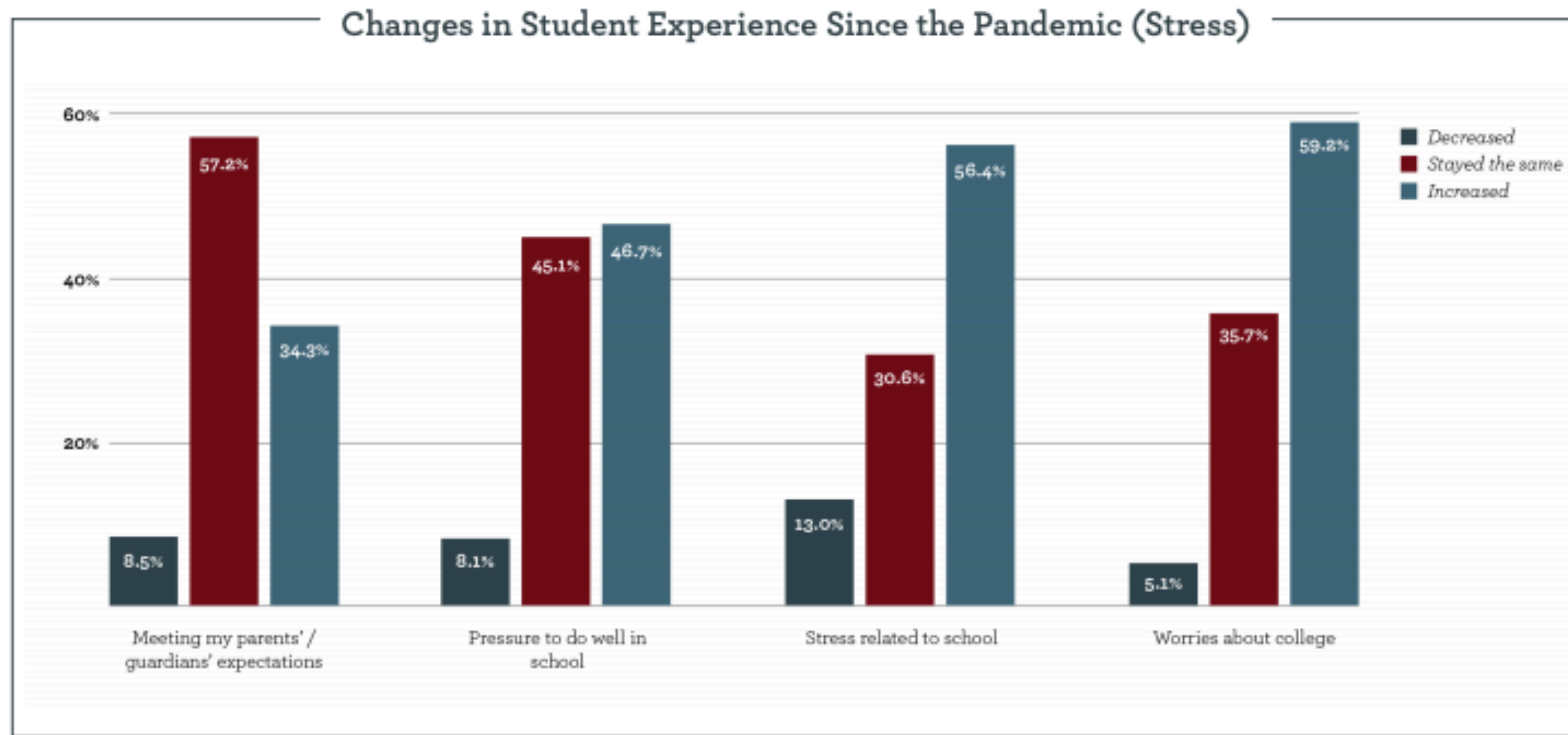
The College Board quietly released its 2022 year-end reports this week and the numbers are fairly bleak. In almost every state and territory, the number of test-takers in the '22 graduating class is significantly below the last pre-pandemic number in 2019. In some states the percent of test-takers is more than 50% lower than three years ago. (In Oregon, symbolically referenced in the image above, the decrease was 49.85%).

This trend is not surprising given the growth of test-optional and test-free colleges. In 2019, approximately 45% of bachelors degree granting institutions were test optional. Today the number is roughly 80%. Given that student standardized test-taking behavior mirrors college admissions policies, as more colleges adopt long-term test-free or test-optional policies it is likely that more students will forgo participation in testing.

The ACT also continues to hemorrhage test takers. FairTest's analysis of how the distribution of lost test takers has resulted in lower ACT scores can be found in the Forbes article "[ACT Score Decline: Lost Learners Not Learning Loss](#)".

I am young, so this is the time for me to start the next chapter of my life -- and the best is yet to come, right?


As a writer yourself, what is your advice for beginning the walking stage, which eventually will lead to running and ultimately, the chasing and then the catching of one's dreams and passions?

PATIENCE

The ability to tolerate the time and discomfort that is part of finding your people and places.



Patience take getting comfortable with the uncomfortable...

Use People, Places, and Patience

Example: #1 Social Transition

1. **Where are the THREE places on campus you can do the things you love to do with people who share similar interests?**

Students identify clubs, organizations, and activities that have been part of high school. What would you like to experience in college? Do they need to be selected? Explore interests based on what you have done in the past and what student would like to explore in the future.

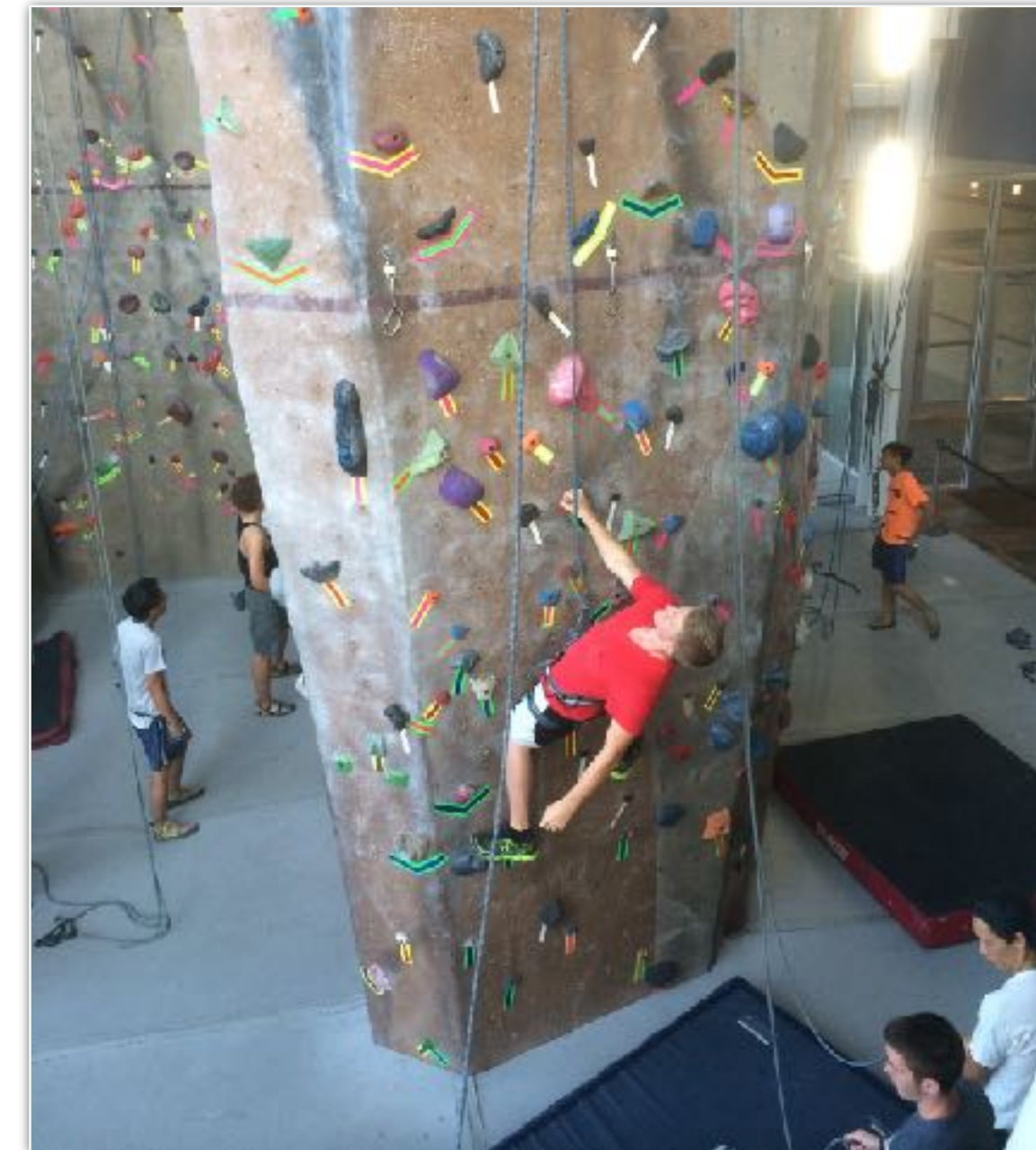
2. **Who are FIVE people in each place who can answer your questions?**

Within each club, activity, or organization students identify people who can answer questions. People fall under three categories.

1) People who are paid to help. 2) People who volunteer to help. 3) People who can be enlisted to help (admissions staff, campus professionals, counselors, leaders of activities and orgs, friends of family, online contacts). Students will contact these people and ask specific questions.

3. **How patient will you need to be while finding your people and places?**

Students ask the five people in their corner how long it took for them to find their people and places. Students create a realistic timeline based in reliable information.

5 Simple Rules for Parents

HARLAN COHEN'S Five Simple Rules for Parents

- 1. GET COMFORTABLE WITH THE UNCOMFORTABLE**
Both you and your child will get uncomfortable. Fighting it only creates more stress. Facing it allows you to guide, support and help your child (and yourself).
- 2. DON'T PANIC! THINK PEOPLE, PLACES AND PATIENCE**
Who are your 5 people? Where are your 3 places? How long will it take for expectations to meet reality? You and your child need people, places, and patience.
- 3. THEIR STRUGGLES BELONG TO THEM, THEIR VICTORIES BELONG TO YOU.**
Give your child space and time to struggle. Let them practice. Better to have them struggle down the hall than across the country. (Oh, and their victories belong to them too!)
- 4. APPLY THE 24 HOUR RULE.**
When they text, call, or ask for help, give them 24 hours. Either the problem will still be there 24 hours later, or they will have solved the problem.
- 5. ASK: WHAT DO YOU THINK YOU SHOULD DO?**
After you ask the question, give them 24 hours to answer it. Let them struggle. Direct them to people and places. Be patient. Allow them to get comfortable with the uncomfortable.

Keep track throughout the year and take the stress out of planning for college. Getting ready for college doesn't have to be stressful. Follow our College Planning Timeline to stay on track.

FALL SENIOR YEAR

- MEET WITH YOUR HIGH SCHOOL COUNSELOR**
Get their advice on staying on track during this all-important senior year.
- DO YOUR COLLEGE RESEARCH**
Visit in person and research online to learn more about schools you're interested in.
- COMPLETE THE FAFSA AND OTHER FINANCIAL AID FORMS**
The US Department of Education offers free resources to help you complete the FAFSA.
- WRITE YOUR ADMISSIONS ESSAY**
Ask your parents, teacher, or high school counselor to proof it before you submit it.
- FINISH YOUR APPLICATIONS**
Pay attention to deadlines. Early decision and early action applications are usually due between October 1-November 1.

WINTER SENIOR YEAR

- PAY ATTENTION TO YOUR GRADES**
Have your high school counselor send your midyear grades to the schools you applied to.
- HAVE YOUR TEST SCORES SENT TO THE SCHOOLS YOU'RE APPLYING TO**
Fill out a request form at the College Board or ACT.

SPRING SENIOR YEAR

- REVIEW YOUR STUDENT AID REPORT**
Learn why this report is important for getting financial aid, and get tips on understanding your report.
- CONSIDER ACCEPTANCE LETTERS AND FINANCIAL AID AWARDS**
Use a comparison tool to keep track of the financial aid offers.
- RESEARCH STUDENT LOANS IF NEEDED**
Carefully review the terms, such as repayment lengths, repayment options, and interest rates. You can use College Ave Student Loans' calculator to see your loan options before applying.
- FORMALLY CHOOSE YOUR COLLEGE!**
Notify the school of your decision to enroll, and write to the other schools you were admitted to as well to let them know your plans.
- SEND IN YOUR DEPOSIT**
Be sure to have a letter of acceptance from the school in hand before you send in your deposit.

SUMMER SENIOR YEAR

- MAKE A COLLEGE BUDGET**
You'll find many free college budgeting templates online.
- APPLY FOR STUDENT LOANS IF NEEDED**
Once you apply, keep copies of applications and keep a spreadsheet to track responses.
- KEEP TABS ON COLLEGE BILLS**
Bills for tuition and other fees will start rolling in by mid-June and usually are due by mid-August.
- ATTEND ORIENTATION**
Many universities offer in-person orientation sessions, as well as online sessions for those who can't visit campus before classes start.
- PICK YOUR FALL CLASSES**
Popular classes may fill up quickly. Choose classes as early as possible so you can get into your top choices.
