1. Competition remains high

Colleges have seen a more significant influx of applicants during the 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 admission cycles, "largely because many of these schools went test-optional," College Data stated. The Common Application reported that this trend continued in 2022-2023, with applications through its portal increased by 7.5% from the previous year. Application volume increases in the nation's most selective colleges and smaller, less competitive public colleges. With a larger body of applicants, admissions rates have been simultaneously declining.

As acceptance rates continue to fall, "even the most qualified candidates cannot be guaranteed an offer of admission," Lauren Dodington, a college admissions adviser at The BestU, told College Data. No matter how high your grades or test scores, all students "should have a range of colleges that are possible fits."

2. Test-optional applications are more common

Speaking of test-optional applications, over 80% of four-year colleges will not require students to submit <u>SAT</u> or ACT scores for the 2023-2024 cycle, according to the National Center for Fair & Open Testing (FairTest) data. Many schools intend to extend their test-optional or test-blind policies through the next school year, while a few have maintained or reinstated their testing requirements. As a result of the 'boom in test-optional schools," advisers suggest that students who "fall at or above the 50th percentile of the college's previous freshman class" submit their scores, College Data noted.

3. Early admissions are the new regular admissions

Another significant trend is a shift toward more applicants for early admission or action. Before the pandemic, most schools admitted between 20% to 30% of their first-year classes through earlier admissions, per College Data, but that has changed over the past few years. "Selective colleges are filling more of their incoming classes early to reduce the uncertainty of regular-decision cycles, in which students might be weighing acceptances from multiple schools," Jefferey Salingo explained in The Atlantic. In last year's cycle, Barnard College admitted 62% through early admission, Boston University accepted 50%, and the University of Pennsylvania 51%.

Applying for early decision is the "best way to demonstrate your interest in a particular college and assure highest consideration in the pool," Aviva Legatt advised in Forbes. Still, she said, students should remember that early admissions agreements are binding, while early action is less restrictive and nonbinding.

4. Direct admissions offer a new path

Jenny Rickard, the president and CEO of the Common App, told Higher Ed Dive she sees "different pathways to admission, like direct admissions, becoming more popular." Direct admissions programs, like the ones offered by Niche and Concourse Global, allow students to be accepted to participating schools based on their profiles, eliminating the need for an application. These initiatives are "about changing the narrative of a college education from one of scarcity to one of opportunity," Rickard noted, "by ensuring students know that college opportunity is an abundant resource — and one that's available to them." Direct admissions "puts the agency back into the student's hands," she added.

5. The importance of essays may vary

Potential applicants should also be aware of the "possibility that some colleges will drop admission essay requirements," Legatt said in Forbes. With the ghost of ChatGPT and other generative AI tools lingering, many institutions are looking for different ways for students to express

College Admissions Are Still Unfair

But when fancy schools like Amherst kill legacy preferences, they do get a little fairer.

This week Amherst College announced that it was ending the use of legacy preferences in its admissions process. Its president, Biddy Martin, acknowledged that providing an advantage to applicants who are the children of alumni "inadvertently limits educational opportunity." When incredibly wealthy, highly selective colleges such as Amherst (endowment: \$3.7 billion; admission rate: 8 percent) make an announcement like this, it's tempting to pour a bucket of cold water on the self-congratulatory fireworks they're lighting for themselves. That should not happen this time.

Still, the temptation is real. Why congratulate a college for doing something it should have done a long time ago? Many large public universities, including the University of California, the University of Texas, and Texas A&M, dropped legacy preferences years ago, as did Johns Hopkins University two years ago and MIT and CalTech before it. Pomona College, a highly ranked liberal-arts college like Amherst, dropped legacy preference in 2017. What's more, even at those places that give the offspring of alumni an edge, or what admissions offices call a "tip," legacies usually account for a small share of the enrolled class, and many of those admits would likely have gotten in without the advantage, or so the admissions deans defending the practice of birthright advantage like to say.



As a new college admissions cycle gets underway with the launch of the 2024 Common Application on Tuesday, August 1, a new tally shows that a record 85% of U.S. bachelor's degree-granting colleges and universities will not require ACT or SAT scores from recent high school graduates seeking to enroll in Fall 2024.

According to the National Center for Fair & Open Testing (FairTest), an all-time high of more than 1,900 U.S. colleges and universities have announced that they will practice ACT/SAToptional or test-free admissions for this fall's high school seniors. Several dozen additional schools have not yet made public their testing requirements for Fall 2024 admissions, but most are expected to remain test optional.




Stats You NEED To Know

Navigating the first year in college can be one of the MOST difficult and daunting times. Too many students needlessly struggle, costing them time, money, and emotional energy. (Source: ACHA-NCHA Spring 2023 survey and U.S. Department of Education)

- 47.8 percent of students reported having ACADEMIC problems or challenges. Of this group, 87 percent said this issue caused them moderate or high distress.
- 50.8% of College students reported feeling LONELY over the past 12 months
- 50.3 percent of students reported having FINANCIAL problems or challenges over the past 12 months.
- 28.2 percent of students reported having ROOMMATE problems or challenges over the past 12 months.
- Four-year graduation rate for students attending public colleges and universities is 33.3%. The six-year rate is 57.6%. At private colleges and universities, the four-year graduation rate is 52.8%, and 65.4% earn a degree in six years.

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




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
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




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
